CANADA'S 150th

In honour of Canada's upcoming 150th birthday, The Rockcliffe News will publish a series of Rockcliffe History stories throughout the coming year. But this time, Happy Birthday Canada! Here's what's going on in our Nation's Capital on the big day!

In 2017, Canada Day celebrates the 150th anniversary of Canada's Confederation, which took place on July 1, 1867. To stay informed regarding all the Canada Day 2017 celebrations in Ottawa, visit the Canadian Heritage website, www.canada.ca/en/canadian-heritage.html.

Crowds will gather on Parliament Hill for a 9:00 am flag raising ceremony and the Changing of the Guard ceremony, followed by the carillon concert featuring the Peace Tower bells at 10:00 am. Be there at noon for a thrilling performance by the Snowbirds Demonstration team, and a noon hour show filled with cultural entertainment. For families, the Canadian Museum of History will host a variety of activities especially for children ages 3 to 12 including games, physical activities, performances and inflatable slides. For revelers of all ages there will be free activities at most of the area's national museums and institutions.

Parliament Hill will be the focal point for Canada Day celebrations, with a giant stage featuring Canadian performers throughout the day, the noontime playing of "O Canada" and a flyby by Canada's Snowbirds aerobatics team and other military aircraft. The celebrations will spill over from Parliament Hill to venues on both sides of the Ottawa River, including Major's Hill Park and the Canadian Museum of History in downtown Gatineau, with fun and activities for people of all ages. The day is capped off with a massive fireworks finale visible from any vantage point downtown. Get a good spot by 10:00 pm, as that's when the fireworks light up the sky. Happy Canada Day!

Revenues were up over last year and in spite of cool, cloudy weather on the first day, the crowds were as strong as ever. An element of elegance was added this year in the form of a string quartet that was on hand Saturday to serenade the literati as they combed the tables for treasures. Many thanks are due to chief organizers Jane Dobell and Linda McDonald and the huge stable of volunteers who pitch in during the year to sort, price, box and shift

the masses of books that are accumulated each year. I would also like to recognize and thank this year's sponsors, RBC Wealth Management | Montgomery Asset Management and Dymon Storage, for their generous support, and Epicuria Fine Food Store and Catering for their magnificent chili and sandwiches for the volunteers during the sale. This year marks the end of an era as the indomitable Jane Dobell steps down as the lead organizer of the Book Sale. Jane has been an incredible force and deserves enormous gratitude for her work. In early May, a reception was held at the Rockcliffe Library to honour Jane and the other founding volunteers of the Book Sale, Di Bethune, Sheila Nelles and Barbara Barker. Councillor Tobi Nussbaum was on hand to present to them the model of a commemorative plaque that will be placed in a suitable location outside the library.

Being an odd-numbered year, the Village Foundation's biennial Dining with the Ambassadors event was held on a balmy April 28th evening. A huge crowd filled the Community Hall and Library for the pre-dinner cocktail and I was impressed by the number of people there who reside outside Rockcliffe Park. Ricarda and I were fortunate to be hosted by His Excellency Abdulhamid Alfailakawi, the Ambassador of the State of Kuwait. Excellent food and lively conversation made for a lovely evening. The RPRA would like to extend our recognition and gratitude to all the foreign missions who participated in this year's soiree.

The annual Village Clean-up was held the next day and saw 39 keen folks turn up to help. Teams collected 44 bags of leaves and twigs from the areas surrounding the Community Hall and Village Green, and 12 bags of garbage from those who fanned out and scoured the roadsides. Many thanks to **Joan Kellett** for organizing the event, and to everyone who came out that day.

The RPRA continues to monitor the water levels in the Pond. A new electrical panel has been installed to control the pump that will be used when needed to try to maintain a high water level. See Brian Dickson's report in this newsletter for an update on what is happening there. As a reminder to all members of the community, the hours for swimming in the Pond are strictly limited to between 7:00 am and 2:00 pm.

Our defence of the new Heritage Conservation District Plan is ongoing. The Heritage Committee has been extraordinarily busy with new applications for modifications to existing buildings. The process is frustrating as the HCDP is under an appeal that is due to be heard at the Ontario Municipal Board in September. Thanks go to Susan d'Aquino and her colleagues on the Heritage Committee for the many hours of work they devote to trying to conserve the essence of our heritage neighbourhood.

By now, many of you will have had a visit from one of the RPRA Board members who have been circulating around the Village as part of our May-June Membership Drive. I hope that you are convinced that renewing or joining the RPRA is worthwhile, so a warm "Welcome" to all new members. It is my sincere hope that you will seek ways to become more involved in your community association. Why not start by coming out to the first RPRA Outdoor Family Movie Night on June 30 in the Jubilee Gardens? This is the first time we are doing this in Rockcliffe and if it works well, we will look at having more evenings such as this one. Please help make this a success and feel free to offer your requests for future film features.

Finally, those of you who have had occasion to look at our website will be aware of its shortcomings. I am pleased to announce that we are rebuilding it on a new platform to better serve our residents. We hope to be able to link to a new Facebook page and Twitter feed to get through to a wider audience. Fear not, though, we will retain our members' email blasts for those of you who, like me, remain off the Facebook/Twitter grid and, of course, we will continue to publish our trusty newsletter every other month. We hope to have the new site up by September.

HERITAGE MATTERS

270 Buchan Road

On May 24, City Council voted 13 to 10 to refuse Richcraft Properties' application to demolish the beautiful Grade I heritage house at 270 Buchan Road and replace it with a much larger house. What Richcraft was asking was starkly at odds both with the new Rockcliffe Park Heritage Plan and with protections that have been in place and respected for the twenty years that Rockcliffe Park has been a Heritage Conservation District.



This was a watershed decision with immense implications for the future protection of the heritage of Rockcliffe Park and of the other 17 heritage districts in Ottawa. This was the first time that anyone had applied to demolish a Grade I house in Rockcliffe. This case has been viewed with great interest as a test case of the wider public interest vs. the private interests of developers/owners.

We owe much to Mayor Watson who, just before the vote was taken at council, spoke strongly in favour of respecting our Heritage Plan which council had approved unanimously only a year ago, and highlighted what a terrible precedent it would set if this Grade I house were demolished. We also owe much to Councillor Tobi Nussbaum, who worked tirelessly with us to achieve the desired outcome. Heritage Ottawa also deserves great thanks for weighing in repeatedly on this matter, saying "there is no possible justification for demolition of a Grade I contributing building in a heritage conservation district."

The struggle to save the house at 270 Buchan and our Heritage Plan is, however, not over. Richcraft Properties has appealed both Council's decision and the Plan to the Ontario Municipal Board. The City will be defending its decision and the Heritage Plan at the OMB in September. We are gearing up to do whatever we can to help.

Excerpts from Mayor Jim Watson's comments to City Council (May 24, 2017) on the application to demolish the house at 270 Buchan Road:

I'm asking Members of Council to support our Heritage District Plan and vote against demolishing this building.

I remind everyone we ALL voted for the Rockcliffe Park Heritage Conservation District Plan and we all knew what we were voting for. It was to protect and preserve the character of that particular community. And in preparation of the Plan, every building in the district was researched and analyzed, evaluated with a score based on environmental, historical and architectural significance. And, yes, there were changes to the score [for 270 Buchan], because new information came forward since the original scoring. But even with an alteration, it still remained the highest grade – a Grade I building – in the Heritage Conservation Area.

People have said, well, you know the building is not in good shape. Well, there's someone living there. And it meets all the standards of the City of Ottawa, the building code, and Grade I buildings cannot be demolished except in extraordinary circumstances. And those extraordinary circumstances are things like fire or flood damage and so on. And it should be noted that although Council approved the Rockcliffe Plan only in 2016, the house located at 270 Buchan Road is one of the original 200 buildings that received the highest designation by the previous municipality of Rockcliffe in 1997.

So I think what we have before us is a key opportunity for us to support what we all supported unanimously in the Heritage Conservation District vote in 2016. And it would seem rather strange – literally, the ink isn't dry on the document – and the first application through the door, we're ready to throw out the entire Heritage District Conservation Area. And as someone pointed out, this does set a precedent. All of a sudden if someone sees this happening, why not open the flood gates – I've got a Grade I building, I'm going to ask for demolition because I want to put a different building up. Well, it defeats the whole purpose of the heritage conservation concept - that we want these areas to remain as part of our built heritage.

I think it's important that we actually support what we supported. And we not simply go down the path, simply because some person wants to demolish a home. You know, the reality is anyone buying in a neighbourhood that has a Heritage Conservation District knows that - or they should know it or they should have a good real estate agent or a lawyer to tell them, so that they're not surprised and feel hard done by by the City that doesn't want to bend its rules that we just voted for a year ago.

83 Placel Road

The owners of this property have been charged by the City under the Ontario Heritage Act with demolishing a building without the required permit. They had been given approval to make minor additions to the house, but as



neighbours reported to us and the City on March 30, the bulk of the house had suddenly been turned into a pile of rubble. The case is scheduled to be heard in July.

35 Lakeway Drive

The City has approved the application to demolish the Grade II house at 35 Lakeway Drive. We supported the application because the existing house does not contribute strongly to the heritage character of Rockcliffe Park and the new house is very respectful of the streetscape and of the provisions of our Heritage Plan. The greenscape in front of the house will be significantly enhanced. It was a pleasure to work with the owners, the **Hunters**, to arrive at this outcome.

Rockcliffe Park Spring Book Sale Breaks Records (the non-vinyl kind) and Builds Communities!

Volunteers at the Rockcliffe Park branch of the Ottawa Public Library (OPL) Spring Book Sale, held April 22 and 23, had every reason to whoop with joy at its close. They had achieved the highest sales in its history!

"Over the past 20+ years, this sale has totally transformed," said Jane

Dobell, Spring Book Sale organizer and Rockcliffe Park Residents Association (RPRA) Library Committee Chair. "From humble beginnings, its scope has increased dramatically. This year we offered over 35,000 books for sale, which is also a record, and we are deeply grateful to residents of Rockcliffe Park and surrounding communities for their generous donations. Without their support, there would be no Spring Book Sale!"

Book enthusiasts, who came from all over Metro Ottawa and beyond, lined up from early morning all along Springfield Road and far down Buena Vista Avenue before swarming into the sale. They praised the high quality of the books, the number of genres and the organization. Also popular and new this year was the addition of light classical music played by a professional string quartet, which created a warm and convivial atmosphere.

But this event is about so much more than just sales. Over the years, it has become a social hub for volunteers in Rockcliffe Park and surrounding areas. "We had more than 120 for this sale and their ages ranged from 14 to 90 years!" said Linda McDonald, Spring Book Sale Volunteer Coordinator. "They are so committed and generous with both their time and donations," she continued. "But while they work almost year round to make this sale happen, they also have fun and



make new friends. It's become a real community event."

The Rockcliffe Park Spring Book Sale was attended by Jim Watson, City of Ottawa Mayor; Tobi Nussbaum, Rideau-Rockcliffe City Councillor; Mona Fortier, MP, Ottawa-Vanier; Nathalie Des Rosiers, MPP, Ottawa-Vanier; Peter Lewis, presi-



Sports Pad and Field House Update

The recent fundraising party at Sutherland Restaurant, hosted by Shawn and Louise Malhotra, was a great success and raised \$20,000 for the new all-purpose sports pad and field house. More than 175 people attended the event and it was a great example of our community coming together to strengthen our neighbourhood.

The sports pad and field house design has been developed by local architects Linebox Studios and they have provided a fresh perspective on how our community can use this important gathering space at the Village Green Park. The design includes a multi-purpose 65' x130' asphalt sports pad with permanent boards and appropriate lighting that can encourage summer activities such as basketball, ball hockey and Pickleball, as well as our favourite winter sport, ice hockey.

With a permanent pad and boards in place, the rink season would be greatly extended and the structure would contribute to significantly more ease in ice surface maintenance.

The design also includes a dynamic new field house which would provide our community with a vibrant and welcoming gathering space that meets a variety of needs. It would provide a changing space for skaters, an accessible bathroom, a kitchenette with appropriate amenities for hosting events, and ample storage for seasonal sports equipment.

The proposed design of the field house and sports pad will be presented to the RPRA at its Board meeting on June 21. We will begin the formal application process for construction approvals with the City of Ottawa Heritage Planners this summer.

In addition, we have had positive preliminary discussions with the City Parks Department regarding overall upgrades and improvements to the Village Green Park. We have also confirmed that we will receive a fundraising matching grant from the City for all money raised up to \$490,000.

We welcome your feedback throughout this design process. Please come out to the RPRA meeting in June to help us create a facility and park that successfully meets the needs and expectations of our community.

Ottawa New Edinburgh Club **Embarks on Visioning Process** for its Historic Boathouse



In the late fall of 2016, with support from the NCC, the Ottawa New Edinburgh Club embarked on a visioning process that could one day lead to a significant restoration of the historic boathouse with both Federal and City heritage designations. Under the guidance of professor Mariana Esponda, an expert in sustainable heritage conservation, 13 fourth-year students at the Azrieli School of Architecture and Urbanism at Carleton University were tasked with reimagining the boathouse and the overall ONEC site, and putting forward fresh ideas for utilization of the building and how the broader community could continue to engage with the beautiful Ottawa River in the future. Over the course of the winter, a series of on- and off-site consultations took place with current stakeholders, leading to each student developing a design based on their own learning and interpretation.

On April 13, 2017, the student final presentations were made to a panel of heritage experts and representatives from both ONEC and the NCC. While some of the students took a far-reaching, blue-sky approach, others felt that a more minimalist intervention was appropriate. Regardless of the method, every design had something compelling to propose. The student projects will be on public display at Doors Open Ottawa on June 3 and 4 and can also be seen by appointment through the ONEC office.

An exciting second phase of this project follows with the support of a grant from MITACS. One Carleton architecture program student has been selected to undertake a 3-D laser scan that will give precise renderings of the entire boathouse. MITACS is a national, not-for-profit organization that builds partnerships, which support industrial and social innovation in Canada.

2017 Budget: A Stronger, **Healthier Ontario**

Ontario's 2017 Budget includes significant investments in health care and education in order to support families and improve the services people rely on most. It is also a balanced budget – the first since the global recession. Thanks to the hard work of the people of Ontario, our economy is strong and unemployment is at a ten-year low. Ontario is leading all of Canada and the G7 in economic growth. By delivering on a commitment to balance the budget this year, we are able to invest more in health care and education, and make life more affordable for everyone across the province.

With the new OHIP+: Children and Youth Pharmacare program, Ontario will be the first province in Canada to offer free drug coverage for more than 4,400 medications for children and youth under the age of 24, beginning in January 2018. RPPS Students Participate in First Ottawa Coding Quest Arcade

On May 1, Mme Sylvie's Grade 5 and Mme Gordon's Grade 6 from RPPS took part in a Coding Quest Arcade pilot project at the Aviation Museum in Ottawa. Students worked collaboratively in class, taking different parts of the project to research various topics, display creatively and report about the event. Several schools, including RPPS, then presented their video games at the museum.

Coding Quest was made possible for the first time in Ottawa this year through a collaboration with the Learning Partnership and the OCDSB. The Learning Partnership is a charity that uses funding from corporate Canada, education and government organizations to enhance public education. The Learning Partnership organized the project by hiring retired educators and people with technology backgrounds to train them. They then support teachers and students to code around Canada. Over 37,000 students across Canada participated in the coding challenge this year, which means that the 525 students participating in Ottawa were only a small fraction of the students nationwide! 
